


Festive Food and Drink from the Borders!

Mozart and Charpentier Come to Kington

20's Plenty for Kington Town Centre?

Back in 2014 Kington Town Council adopted KLAP (Kington Local Action Plan) which reflected the views of Kington's residents on actions they felt would enhance the town. One action which was strongly supported was for traffic calming measures to increase pedestrian safety and provide safe routes for walking and cycling within the town centre.

Across the world countries and communities are setting 20mph/30kmh limits for urban and village roads. In the Netherlands 70% of urban roads have a 30kmh or lower limit. In Scandinavian countries 30kmh is the norm in villages and towns. And whilst the UK has been a late starter, in the last 10 years over 25% of the population has gained a 20mph limit on the streets where they live, learn, shop or work. Most of our iconic cities have a 20mph limit for most roads. 43% of Londoners live on 20mph roads and 75% of people in Inner London Boroughs. Even complete counties such as Lancashire, Sefton, Calderdale, Clackmannanshire and Fife have adopted wide-area 20mph limits for all.

Hereford is beginning to catch up with 20 mph limits being introduced in many city centre streets. What about Kington? The KLAP report showed a strong desire to improve safety on the High Street with 94% wanting action. Is there a case for a 20mph speed limit within the town centre eg Bridge St, High St, Duke St, Church St, Mill St including the Primary school and possibly Crabtree Road?

A 20mph limit is not just about tackling speeding. The wider benefits may explain why they are becoming so popular throughout the country. There are clear health benefits of more walking and cycling, and less pollution; a 20mph limit makes a significant reduction in the most dangerous NOx and PM10 emissions hence they are supported by public health bodies such as NICE (National Institute for Health and Care Excellence), Public Health England, Association of Directors of Public Health and WHO (World Health Organisation). Research shows that making places better for walking and cycling can boost trade by up to 40%; pedestrians spend more than people arriving by car.

Kington Poppy Festival

- 4 November 6pm: All Souls. A Service to Remember the Departed.
- 6 November 7pm: Beetle Drive.
- 8 November 7pm: Friends of St Mary's present An Evening with Major General Arthur George Denaro CBE DL. Wine & nibbles.
- 10 November 7.30pm: Evening of Music and Poetry with Kington Community Choir which will be singing a selection of popular songs from WWI accompanied by readings of poems from the period. Wine & nibbles.
- 11 November 10am: Remembrance Service, St Mary's Church followed by Act of Remembrance at the War Memorial.
- 11 November 6pm; Choral Evensong and close of Festival.

During each of these events a poppy will be planted "In Flanders Fields".



As part of the Kington Poppy Festival in St Mary's Church a significant display will be created: a field of poppies, one for each of the First World War dead from Kington and Huntington. The display will be added-to each day of the Festival with the final poppy being laid at the conclusion of the church service on Remembrance Sunday.

Locally Kington Stall Success

Another season has now finished for the Locally Kington stall at the Friday Market. After our last week we contributed £100 to the Kington Food Bank, to support their excellent work (the Friday Market as a whole contributes surplus goods to the Food Bank).

This was our 4th year. The initial core team was



Roz Brown, Peter Frost and Fiona Shone, with all still involved, in some way. The key idea is to build local resilience and encourage the use of delicious locally produced food and other resources. We have large and small suppliers, from Newport House and Huntington Court to many small gardens. There's a commission for goods sold and we pay suppliers at the end of the morning. We recently reduced the commission to 20% (or 10% for those working an occasional shift on the stall). The stall is busy and a magnet for chat and laughter, even

political debate! Over the four years we have built a loyal and enthusiastic customer base. Most Fridays will see folks waiting as we set up, to swoop on goods often picked that very morning. People regularly do their weekly fruit and veg shop, using Locally Kington and the nearby excellent Grapevine.

Locally Kington joins the Market in late April and finishes in late October. The stall is open from 9am to 1pm. There is always a good core supply of seasonal fruit and veg. Each year brings new and exciting goods. This year we sold many punnets of Japanese wineberries and hazelnuts for the first time. We also had other local goods and crafts including cards, bat houses, hazel rods and garden cloches. We have cut out plastic bags, offering either paper bags or reusable home-made mesh bags, available for a small deposit. We also sell coffee and cakes and provide tables and chairs in the Place de Marines. A bright sunny day will see locals and visitors chatting together and a vibrant hubbub at the market.

April 2019 will see new ideas for the stall. This is a chance for anyone in the Kington area to contribute new innovations. There is also an opportunity to plant those extra seeds and support the local supply of fresh and tasty food. Be part of our stall! We find that the more supply of goods we have, the more people arrive to buy it. Look for the stall next April, talk to us and be part of an important movement.

Community Wheels

For some people, getting to the surgery can be a problem and this can apply to those who live in Kington itself as well as those living in the outlying areas.

Community Wheels is available for all who need it and qualify to use it. You have to:

- live within the catchment area
- not have access to a car
- be unable to use public transport

The catchment area includes Kington and most of the area covered by the medical practice; you may be unable to access public transport because of mobility issues or lack of available service. Even if you do not meet these criteria you may still be able to get help if you need it, so do please get in touch.

Transport is available for surgery visits, hospital appointments and much more. As well as cars, driven by volunteers who use their own vehicles, there are two wheelchair accessible mini-buses which can be used for individuals or groups. The volunteer drivers are all DBS checked, and mini-bus drivers are MIDAS trained.

There is an annual membership fee and a small charge for each journey, but this is far less than you would have to pay for a taxi. The service is supported by and does receive some funding from Herefordshire Council, which helps it to operate at such reasonable charges, but its main strength is in its pool of volunteer drivers who give their time for nothing.

It is essential to book ahead, normally a minimum of 48 hours in advance of when you want to travel, but if you have an absolute emergency please call anyway, as if it is possible to help we will.

Please remember that this service is there to help you, and if it is underused then the funding may be cut, and the service discontinued.

Kington Food Bank

The Kington Food bank was officially started in January 2013 under the auspices of Kington and District Churches Together. It is open every Friday from 2 – 3pm at the Old Police Station. Vouchers to use the food bank are available from various health care professionals, social services, DASH, Housing Association, Probation Team, Local welfare provision, Mental Health Support, local Clergy and local schools.

Clients who attend the food bank should produce a voucher which entitles them to food for three weeks. The food bank is a generally viewed as a temporary measure to meet the immediate needs of people who are in crisis due to changes in the benefit system or people who are in need of help during difficult periods in their lives.

We have a small team of volunteers and food is donated from the various churches in the area. Money donations are managed by the treasurer of Kington and District Churches together, and this money is used to buy additional food when required.
